*How My Reimage Repair Went

Using Reimage to bring my computer back to its original condition was an experience. The first time I started the repair, it got deep into downloading over 770 files and all of a sudden, my computer warned that the CPU was overheating. I didn’t see any way to pause it, so I forced the computer to shut down. After a few days, I tried running Reimage again. I got almost all of the way though the downloading, but the session was interrupted for unknown reasons. When you start a Reimage Repair, it goes through examining your entire hard drive and operating system for viruses, malware, and all the bad stuff, as well as any corrupted files in your operating system, and replaces them with the correct ones.

A few days later, I gave it another try and it went through the many downloads, which took well over an hour, but one of the problems I wanted repaired was the proper shutdown of my computer, which hadn’t been happening. I had to finish the shutdown myself, so it failed to reboot when the repair was completed, which was necessary to finish the session and I was left with a Reimage “we’ll soon be finished” screen each time I started my computer.

I sent a message to Reimage tech support concerning the failed repair and they responded telling me to run it again in safe mode. When I tried it in safe mode, it couldn’t access the Internet, so nothing could be done. Then they said it was necessary to schedule a remote session to attempt the repair from their end. A week later, I had scheduled a remote session and the tech sent me an e-mail prior to the scheduled time with a “LogMeIn” link to use for my session. Their tech worked over an hour and downloaded

We worked Pittcon <http://www.pittcon.org>, the Annual Pittsburgh Conference on Analytical Chemistry and Applied Spectroscopy, which is mostly about laboratory products and services. Pittcon began as a small conference held annually in Pittsburgh, PA and was originally called The Pittsburgh Conference. Since it’s a one-of-a-kind event, it gradually became larger than originally anticipated so it was necessary to move it to larger facilities and to hold it in other locations. The name was changed to Pittcon, but it’s still referred to as The Pittsburgh Conference. Next year The Pittsburgh Conference will be held in Atlanta, GA.

This 61st annual conference offered almost 2000 booths, as well as many educational and informative breakout sessions during show days. I didn’t learn the attendance, but attendees were numerous and the Expo had interesting booths. I often asked questions concerning what a booth was about and the booth

“autoruns” (Sysinternals) from the Microsoft Web site and installed it. Eventually the machine started shutting down saying it would be downloading 60 updates, but when it finished doing that, it failed to shut off. I never found out why all the updates because I try to keep them up to date.

I received an e-mail saying the session had been interrupted and I needed to reschedule a new session. I finally scheduled a new session a week later and the tech worked almost two hours and finally told me he had decided that the failing shutdown was being caused by my firewall, Online Armor. When he disabled it, he could restart the computer successfully, but when it was activated, the restart failed because the computer failed to shut down. I was convinced and so far the shutdown is working and my firewall is disabled, so that’s where I stand now. He suggested that reinstalling it might help. I’m not sure if I’ll try that, but the peculiar part is that I have been using OnLine Armor successfully for over two years, but the problems started after I installed Internet Explorer 8 recently. What is the connection? Tonight, I noticed that I was unable to launch MS Access so I’m wondering what’s wrong with that now. It wants to install when I launch it.

Reimage is located in Israel and the tech used perfect English in his sessions, which consisted of us communicating via LogMeIn. There is no telephone support. He was patient with my typing and sometimes had questions that he wanted answered in my own words.

During the session, he found Glary Utilities on my machine. I thought I had installed a full version downloaded from Giveawayoftheday.com, but I apparently had actually installed a trial. He asked if I would like him to install it for me and I readily agreed. How helpful is that! While the time duration for the repair was lengthy, I was satisfied to an extent. Not all of my problems were fixed, but my lack of adequate memory could be part of the problem. When I first built the computer, it was enough memory, but because of all the updates and other installed items, memory may be part of the problem. However, it uses Rambus, which is very expensive.

***How To Make Posters**

I was visiting a friend the other day and he was

enlarging some photos to be used as posters. I ask what he was using and it’s a free program called Easy Poster Printer that he read about. It’s at <<http://www.gdsoftware.dk>>. He said it worked well for him. He made a beautiful poster while I watched. It was interesting how it divided the poster up into multiple pages so you could paste them together. That way you don’t need to purchase one of those \$20,000 wide-carriage printers to make a large poster. ***How Is Your Flash Drive Working?**

Browsing the results of a search the other day I noticed H2testw <<http://wareseeker.com/free-h2testw-1.4/>> and took a look. It’s a test you can run to tell you that a flash drive does, or doesn’t, work like it should. There are many places to download this test and it seems to have other uses, but H2testw 1.4 will test your Flash drive and tell you if there are any errors, and won’t hurt your data.

Flash drives are a different type of storage that sometimes perplexes a user. There have been articles on how long they last, but since they are new technology, who really knows for sure. I’ve seen numbers stating their dependability, but do you count the times you use yours? It wouldn’t hurt to check occasionally to see if a Flash drive is working as it should because anything can fail at any time; especially when a user carries it in their pocket or hanging on their neck. After all, just reading the drive has little effect on it, but writing to it and bumping it against pocket items doesn’t help. The product is free.

***Help For Your Downloads**

Downloading files can sometimes be a trying experience when things aren’t going right, but here is a product that will help things along. FlashGet will help your download in many ways including the speed of the download. I’m told FlashGet is a popular download manager and it was suggested by a tech support person. It uses the MHT (Multi-server Hyper-threading Transportation) technique (OK, if they say so), supports various protocols, and has excellent document management features. FlashGet is free-

It is still in a state of flux and still pending. If you just have one or two items for either of the following places, contact me - if I know in advance, you can bring them to a meeting, and I'll take them from there. I just need to know in advance so there aren't too many items on any one day.

Missionary Computer Fellowship, 401 S Magnolia Ave, Orlando, FL; Phone: (407) 422-9265. This is a major organization doing refurbishing and rebuilding, as well as recycling. It is associated with and located in the First United Methodist Church downtown. They only accept phone calls and/or items on Tuesdays and Thursdays. They are not completely religiously oriented. They send reconditioned PCs to missionaries all over the world, as well

as poor villages in Africa, but it is my understanding that if an indigent person approached them, they might be able to get a free computer.

You'll find a **Missionary Computer Fellowship Info And Needs Fact Sheet** elsewhere in this issue. I can tell you it is a large and interesting place; with about 35 volunteers, many retired Martin Marietta people coming in to refurbish and rebuild PC's. One good feature - they wipe ALL hard drives, and reload Windows on them. The pictures show the unloading, and the various workbenches, with separate rooms for laptop work, monitor storage, and the holding room for the stuff they just can't use or make work, so that gets sent for a recycler for disposal.

Southeastern Data, at 142 Park Road in Oviedo, FL 32765 (Off Alafaya Trail, just north of E. McCulloch Road); phone 407-971-4654 has made us the nice offer of allowing CFCS members to drop off most recyclables with no service charge. (There may be a few exceptions.) A First Look at OpenOffice

I have a new mini computer to use for internet access while traveling. I am used to having Microsoft Office for all of my computing needs and would be lost without it or a similar application. I downloaded and installed OpenOffice.org. The OpenOffice suite has six applications: Writer a word processor, Calc a spreadsheet, Impress for presentations, Base a database program, Math an equation editor, and Draw a graphics program. OpenOffice works with a wide variety of formats, including OpenDocument and Microsoft Office 2003 formats. So you can go back and forth between Office and OpenOffice without losing formatting. OpenOffice even exports files to PDF. And best of all, the entire suite is free.

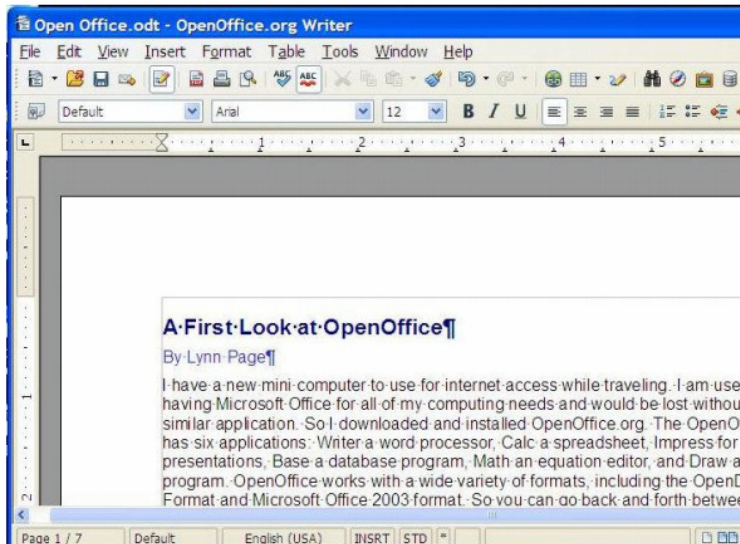
I will be working more with OpenOffice as I use my new mini computer. So I will attempt to provide some of my experiences in the newsletter. For my first look I will see how well the suite of office applications handles opening and working with some of my Microsoft Office files and look a little more at some of the applications.

Writer

OpenOffice.org Writer looks and feels like Word 2003. It lets you produce word processing documents that include graphics, tables, and charts. You can save in a variety of formats, including the standardized OpenDocument (odt) format and Microsoft Word (doc) format. Although Writer doesn't have a save as pdf option as found in Word 2007 you can export the document to pdf. Conversely you can

open and edit Word documents. This is really what I was looking for in OpenOffice.

I found Writer easy to use for simple documents but had to go to Help for some of the differences between it and Microsoft Office. I expected I would have adjustment issues as Microsoft Word 2007 is my favorite and most used application. I have been using Office 2007 long enough that I am no longer completely comfortable with Word 2003.



Writer has all text Formatting tools you need including basic styles and a format painter. I was glad to find see spelling and grammar checking and that I could display non printing characters. Find and replace worked as expected. I did find that the auto-complete feature in Writer displayed a lot of words that I didn't expect. That is not a problem because you just keep typing to ignore the autocomplete or hit enter to accept.

Cropping a graphic is one feature that is different than I expected. Cropping is done through a dialog box by moving the edges in a measured distance. Not as convenient as using the crop handles I am used to but still serviceable. Resizing a graphic is done by dragging the size handles and text wrapping is easily handled with a dialog box. For one last look at Writer's compatibility with Word, I opened one of my Word 2007 documents. Open Office Writer opened the document and all formatting was intact. I did get a notice that the document was opening as read only. I was able save the document

in OpenOffice or Word 2003 format and then edit it.

Calc

Calc is the spreadsheet application in OpenOffice. It again looks and feels like Microsoft Excel 2003. It opened an old CRUG registration spreadsheet generated in Excel 2003. All sheets of the spreadsheet, their relationships and all calculations worked well and all formatting was intact. I could simulate adding student registrants in classes and calculations on all sheets were accurately recorded.

Styles and Formatting make it easy to apply cell formatting, including splitting or merging cell, adding cell borders and backgrounds. Cell content is formatted as in Writer and can even be freely rotated.

Although I haven't worked much with spreadsheets in the last couple of years found using the Formula

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Bar straightforward. The Sum function takes care of a lot of calculations and the Function Wizard helps in choosing and using the other spreadsheet functions. I tried sorting in another of my spreadsheets and it worked well, correctly sorting data by a selected column while recognizing my column headings.

Spreadsheets can be saved in OpenDocument format, an XML based format or a variety of other formats including Excel xls format.

Impress

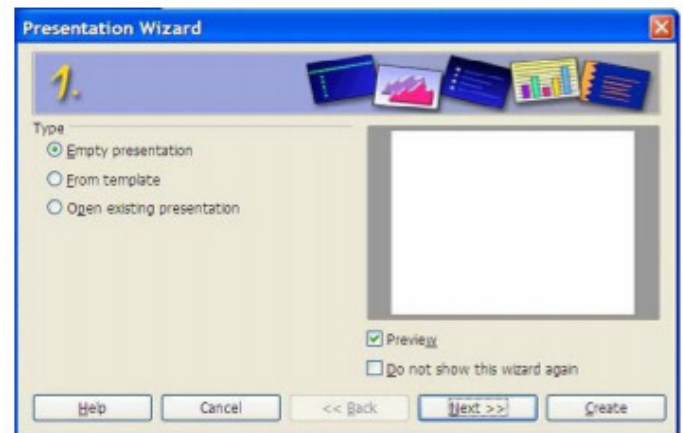
OpenOffice's presentation application Impress can open and modify Microsoft PowerPoint presentations or create slide shows with the presentation wizard. Presentations can include charts, drawing objects, text, multimedia or other items. Animations and slide transitions make the on-screen presentation interesting and professional.

I opened and edited one of my PowerPoint presentations, made changes, saved it to Impress odp format and ran the presentation. Impress looked and felt like PowerPoint while editing and running the presentation. The presentation had the template, smart art graphics, transitions, text formatting and digital images I used when generating it in PowerPoint 2007. I did note that some transitions appeared a little rougher but still ran.

When Impress is opened the presentation wizard starts automatically. You choose to create a new blank presentation, use a template and let the wizard walk you through structuring the presentation or open an existing presentation.

When creating an empty presentation the Presentation Wizard walks through the steps of selecting a background, slide transitions, and speed of presentation if it is to be automatic. Not all of the backgrounds and transitions of PowerPoint are available but there are enough to get by.

If you decide to create a presentation based on a template the wizard lets you select a template based on the type of presentation and the output medium. For many of us this is an on screen presentation but Impress can also create output for overhead transparencies or hard copy. You then specify slide transitions. Then from the list of pages presented by the wizard



select those to be included in the presentation. Once the wizard creates the generic presentation just add your information and tailor the presentation to your needs.



Base

The OpenOffice database application Base unlike the other applications is not directly compatible with Microsoft Access database files. With it you can create and manipulating tables, queries, forms and reports

within the database. Since my intent with this first look at OpenOffice is to look at compatibility with my Microsoft Office files I have not looked at Base. I will look at it at a future time.



Math

Math is OpenOffice.org's equation editor. It can be used for generating mathematical equations. I have not had the opportunity to use the application but it can be used as an equation editor for text documents. Within Writer the equation is treated as an object inside the document.



Draw

I expected Draw to be similar to Paint but that is not the case. It is a vector graphics editor featuring connectors between the available shapes. I have not made any attempt at using Draw at this time.

Conclusions

OpenOffice.org's office suite offers an alternative to Microsoft Office or other office applications. As it is free it can be a solution for someone not wanting to



invest in purchasing a license for one of the software suites. For those like me who use Office but have an extra computer without Office installed it offers a solution. The compatibility lets me copy my Word documents, Excel spreadsheets, and PowerPoint presentations to my mini. I can use and even edit my files in Writer, Calc or Impress and then save in the previous Microsoft format to use again on my desktop or laptop. For those using OpenOffice as their only office suite it lets them save in the Microsoft Office format or even as a pdf. This makes sharing files simple.

Email Scams

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There are at least two dozen people in Nigeria that want to give me twelve million dollars. Imagine that! People are vigorously competing with each other to make me rich. You would think that after all the publicity over the last dozen years everyone would know about the Nigerian scam. Headhunters in New Guinea know about the Nigerian scheme. Lost tribes in the Amazon know about the Nigerian scheme. So why do the scammers keep doing it? Because people keep falling for it. Some folks want to believe, and nothing will stop them no matter what evidence sits in front of them.

Email scams like the one that keeps flowing out of Nigeria can be downright dangerous. Not only have people been scammed out of money, but in a few instances have actually lost their lives. That is a high price to pay for credulity.

Most unsolicited commercial messages (SPAM) may be annoying, but they do little more than eat up some bandwidth. The originators don't want to harm you, just entice you to buy something. It's sometimes called online advertising.

As the Internet evolves, so do the scammers. They have become more sophisticated at attempting to trick us out of our money, hand over personal information, reveal passwords, frighten us or make us believe in something that isn't true.

For example, our current polarized political system has generated distrust of government in some places. A band of swindlers has used these sentiments to construct an email that "warns" you that the Department of Homeland Security and the FBI believe that you are involved in either money laundering activities or somehow complicit in terrorist activity. Information like that, even if false, can make people uneasy.

Fortunately, the scammers have a solution. For the small sum of \$370 the Economic Financial Crimes Commission Chairman will send documentation certifying you as a proper upstanding citizen, thereby avoiding a messy prosecution and jail time. How could anyone pass that up? These government agencies must be terribly busy, and isn't it a great comfort to know that they can resolve important matters by email if you're willing to send them only a few hundred dollars?

Congratulations! You've won the lottery! There are many variations to this theme, but they all involve filling out a form before you can claim your prize. Don't forget to include your social security number since they need to inform the IRS. What makes this scam so devious is that legitimate lotteries really do need this information. One thing that should puzzle you is how could you possibly win a lottery you haven't entered?

Suppose you really did enter the contest or bought a lottery ticket, what then? Legitimate enterprises are aware of these scams and will almost always provide you with an alternate way of supplying the information. In other words, never be careless with personal information.

You receive an email informing you of a "problem" with your bank account. Strange, you don't recall doing business with the bank. All you have to do to resolve the "problem" is click on the provided link and supply information that the bank already knows if you are a customer.

Tens of thousands of people receive these messages. A few may actually be customers of the bank. Some believing the email is real, click on the link, and are taken to a bogus site. Any information provided won't be used to resolve any "problems", but instead be used to clean out your bank account.

There are so many scams out there perpetrated by email it makes you want to give up in disgust. That would be understandable if there were no way to protect yourself, but many people forget the obvious: **Use Common Sense.**

When you get an email that asks you to be part of a plot to move large amounts of money offshore to your bank account by doing business with people

you don't know from a foreign country thousand of miles away, shouldn't that arouse your suspicions?

Any text message that turns out to be an image should be suspect. The only purpose for turning text into images is to defeat spam filters. Be on your guard.

The bad guys are very creative and always seem to be one step ahead of everyone else. The FBI provides a service for citizens to receive the latest information about online scams. Visit the site at least once a month to be aware of new and exciting ways scammers have to separate you from your money.

++++ **Office2010 installed & syncing with iPhone**

I installed Office2010 successfully & synced it with my iPhone. Yea!

Before upgrading, I made sure that I could sync with my iPhone first. Everything that I read said that the 32-bit version would sync, but not the 64-bit. I did some important backup procedures, just in case I had any problems. I made a duplicate PST file and moved it to an external drive. It was almost 5GB and too big to put on a DVD. I backed up all of my Outlook files using ABF's Outlook Backup program <http://www.outlookbackup.com/>, and backed up all of my messages using MessageSave [http://](http://www.techhit.com/messagesave/)

www.techhit.com/messagesave/. Then I did a complete image backup of my hard drive using Acronis TrueImage <http://www.acronis.com/homecomputing/products/trueimage/>

My philosophy is that "a drive not backed up will screw up." So I take every precaution to be able to get back to where I started easily, if something goes wrong.

Once I completed and verified my backups, I inserted the Office2010 disk and started the install. I chose the Upgrade, to maintain all of my settings and especially my Outlook accounts, settings and messages. The install took a long time (well over an hour), but I was patient. When it finished, I had to reboot for everything to reset. The reboot went fine, and I started each of the programs of Office, starting with Word to make sure all was working fine.

Once I had Outlook running and made sure all was well, I made a calendar change and added some info to a contact. I then connected my iPhone and ran iTunes. I clicked on "Sync". It took quite a while to back up the iPhone (longer than usual), and then it uploaded a new podcast, but did not sync with Office. I checked the iPhone to make sure and the changes that I made on the calendar & contact were not updated on the phone.

I then tried to sync again and saw that it was working. When it completed, I checked and the calendar & content items had updated, so all is working. I have since worked with Excel and wrote this article with Word. Now all I have to do to find out the changes between Office2003, Office 2007 and Office2010.

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Google needs no introduction here, as it has been discussed in many previous columns. Google is much more than the ubiquitous search engine, as it now provides mapping services, email, public domain name servers, comprehensive portable online document services, and countless other benefits in a highly competitive field. Recently, Google has been quietly entering the e-book field, where as many as a million books (mostly public domain because of expired copyrights) are currently available for free use, and countless others still under copyright will be available for a fee. Google is not alone in providing free public domain books online in a variety of formats, and it will also not be alone in providing commercial e-books for a fee. In terms of commercially available titles, Google will be a direct competitor to the likes of Amazon and Barnes and Noble, both of which already sell access to countless thousands of

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titles, mostly in proprietary formats only readable on their respective readers.

In 2004, Google announced the "Google Books" project, an ambitious plan to digitize and post online 15 million books within 10 years. The primary source of these books was initially libraries from all over the world, but since the announcement, many of the world's universities have volunteered their literary collections to be digitized by Google. The stated aim of Google is to preserve library books and make them universally accessible. Last November in an interview in the New York Times, Google co-founder Sergey Brin said, "The vast majority of books ever written are not accessible to anyone except the most tenacious researchers at premier academic libraries. Inevitably, the few remaining copies of the books are left to deteriorate slowly or are lost to fires, floods and other disasters." According to a recent story published by the BBC, Google has already digitized over 12 million titles, making it the largest repository of digitized books in the world.

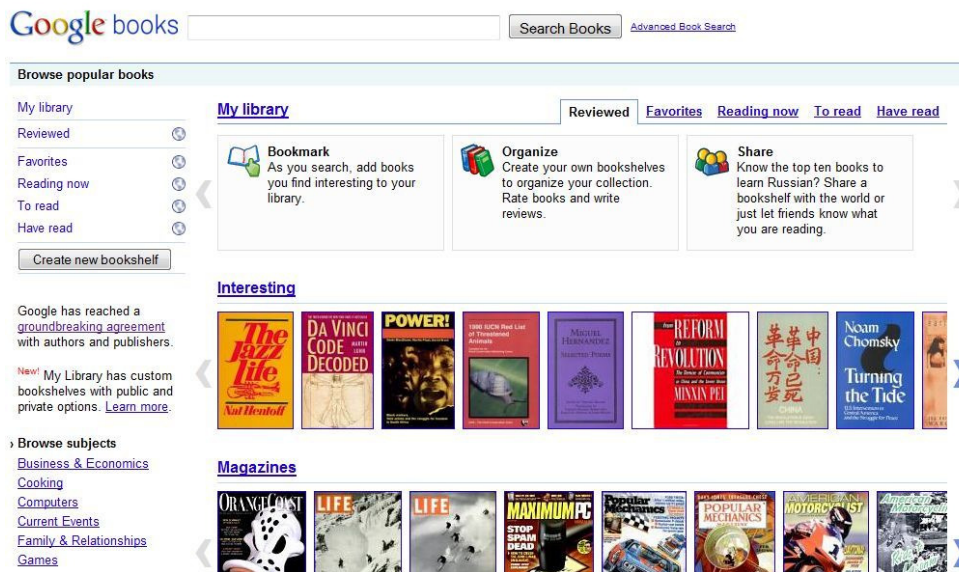
While Google obviously has the technology to digitize, catalog, and make available all of the books it can process, there have been some major legal obsta-

cles to completing the project as planned. Books published before 1923 are in the public domain as their copyrights have expired, allowing them to be freely digitized and distributed. Books published since 1923 may still be under copyright, as the copyright would run for the author's lifetime plus 70 years. Several organizations, including the Authors Guild and the Association of American Publishers have filed lawsuits against Google, which resulted in a settlement in 2008; the problem is that the settlement was never approved by the federal court because of issues raised by government regulators and others. Last November (2009) an amended settlement was reached, but it too is being challenged, and

has not been approved by the court. Books that may still be under copyright that have already been digitized cannot be offered in their entirety by Google, but Google can include small parts of the books in its search engine. Compounding the complexity of the issue is the fact

that many of the authors and their heirs have become nearly impossible to locate in order to get the requisite permissions to enable Google to post the digitized copies.

Despite the copyright limitations and legal restrictions on many of the books published since 1923,

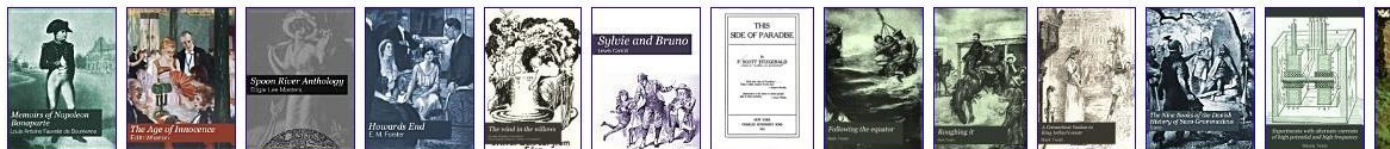
Google has compiled an impressive list of mostly older books that are available for free in digital format, most commonly in the universally readable PDF format. Books digitized and published in PDF retain

ers available for viewing. I recently viewed a 1938 LIFE magazine (still under copyright, but available for viewing) which included stark images of the wars in Spain and China, historical facts that my current college students are oblivious to. It is not just the

their original fonts, graphics, and images exactly as published. Since PDF files can be read on almost any type of digital device, Google may have a competitive advantage over its competitors selling e-books that can only be read on their respective proprietary devices.

During my Christmas break, I stumbled on Google Books by accident while doing personal research on some historical items. I was amazed to find entire texts, complete with all of their pictures, on Google, and downloaded over two dozen entire books from Google. Most of these books were published between 1880 and 1910, and most have the stamp of the New York City Public Library emblazoned on the inside of the front cover, and elsewhere in the books, making their source obvious.

I have always had a fascination for old magazines, and Google Books has helped to satiate my needs. Google Books has a large collection of old magazines, including LIFE, Popular Science, Popular Mechanics, and oth-

news and photos of that date that are of interest to me, as the advertisements display a microcosm of the innocence of American life that is now lost forever. I did download a PDF of the May to October 1893 edition of Popular Science (copyright expired), and found the scientific technology and writings of the day fascinating, as were the portraits of the scientists referenced; the clothing the scientists were wearing looked archaic compared to today's styles. Some of the advertisements of 1893 were most educational, as were stories about life of the day. One story about the homes displayed at the 1892 Columbian Exposition, honoring the 400th anniversary of Columbus discovering America, described the modernistic (circa 1892) homes of the day, including a \$1000 "Workingman's Model Home", two stories plus a cellar, 20x28 feet per story (560 square feet per floor), including three bedrooms. The furniture for this three bedroom home was listed at an aggregate cost of \$300, and total family expenses for a year were listed as food at \$200, clothing at \$100, fuel at \$50, and annual miscellaneous expenses of \$50. Feeding a family of five was listed as 50



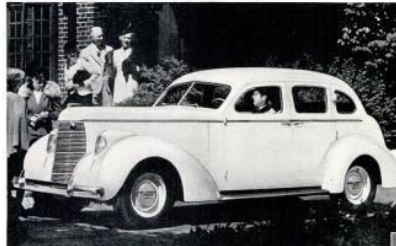
to 60 cents per day. We can learn a lot about history and economics by reading these antique magazines on Google Books.

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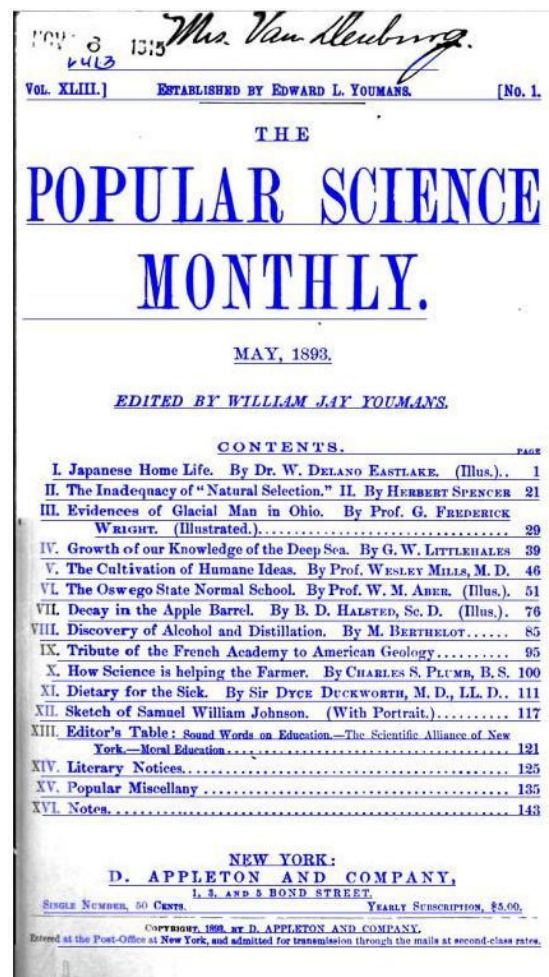


Thousands of more recent books are available for free viewing on Google Books. I teach courses in Business and Economics at LIT, and Google Books lists 14,868 titles in its Business & Economics directory. Google Books also has 149,600 medical books listed, as well as 62,800 cookbooks. While many of the newer books are complete and can be viewed online, many others say, "This is a preview. The total pages displayed will be limited." One cookbook I looked at that contained that statement was the 1975 version of the "Joy of Cooking". While some pages were omitted, I was able to find a lot of interesting recipes in the 900+ pages that were available. On the edge of the browser window was a statement from Google that said, "You can order full copies of any book using the 'Get this book' links to the side of the preview page." Along with the 481,600 books available in the "Law" category, 60,566 under "Humor, and 161,600 under "Travel", as well as the

dozens of other categories, anyone should be able to find a huge selection of books of interest.

Being Google, the entire library of millions of titles is fully searchable, and both the directory and the search results can be sorted into those titles that are either public domain (mostly downloadable as a PDF file), full view, and limited view. Google has provided an excellent resource for readers of all ages. The selection of books currently available is outstanding, and according to some published resources, only makes up about 30% of all of the titles that Google has scanned because of unresolved copyright issues. Once the final legal issues are resolved, the selection of titles should be much bigger. I eagerly look forward to what else might become available from books.google.com.

Best Windows Shortcuts

One of the better qualities of a good operating system like Windows is that there is almost always more than one way to do something. There are items you can select from a file menu, use a shortcut or execute some kind of keystroke combination to carry out an action.

There are some things you do almost every time you use your computer. The six following shortcuts all use a similar series of keystrokes. If you don't know about these shortcuts you probably haven't been using computers for very long, and you don't know what you're missing.

It doesn't matter whether you're working with music files, photos, videos, documents, spreadsheets or portions of a document. Simply highlight what you want with your mouse, hold down the **Ctrl** key, then press and release the indicated key. Don't forget to release the Ctrl key when you're done.

For example, to copy a file, some text or any object: Highlight or select the item with your mouse and then hold the **Ctrl** button down, press the **C** key and release. **Ctrl+C**

To paste the copied item or items: **Ctrl+V** (P was already taken for Print)

Sometimes you want to move an object from one location to another: **Ctrl+X**

Select everything on a screen or in a folder: **Ctrl+A**

Print something: **Ctrl+P** (This is why you can't use this combination to paste).

Oops, I shouldn't have done that: **Ctrl+Z** (Undoes your mistakes)

Now that we've covered the basics, we can move on to some good stuff. Microsoft introduced something called the Windows key when it announced Windows 95 back in the Stone Age. Also known as the Super key, Windows logo key, the WinKey, the Start key, and sometimes the Flag key, it has been with us ever since. Tapping the Windows key opens or

closes the Start menu. If that were all it did there would be nothing else to say. There are several dozen shortcuts that you can easily use with the Windows key in combination with other keys to call up common functions. Here are a few of them:

Win+D: Shows the Desktop

Win+F: Opens the search function

Win+L: Locks the Desktop and lets you switch users

Win+M: Minimizes all open windows

Win+R: Opens the Run box so you can type DOS like commands

Win+P: Very useful with multiple monitors or an external projector

Win+Spacebar: All open windows become transparent so you can see through to the desktop.

There are many others, but these are probably the ones most computer users would invoke most of the time.

Microsoft sometimes does something really terrific, but for whatever reason doesn't tell anyone about it. The company has created an alternate control panel which blows away any tool I've previously seen. Why the company keeps it a secret is beyond me. To create this tool you will need to create a folder, name it, put in a period, and type something called a Globally Unique Identifier (GUID). A GUID is a special type of identifier used in software applications to

provide a unique reference number. The value is represented as a 32 character hexadecimal character string. All you need to be concerned with is to type it accurately. Let Microsoft's engineers worry about the details.

You can create the folder anywhere, but the most logical place for it is on the Desktop. Make sure you're on the desktop and all windows are closed or minimized.

Right-click on an empty area of the desktop and choose New/Folder.

Name the folder. It doesn't matter what you call it, the magic is performed by the GUID.

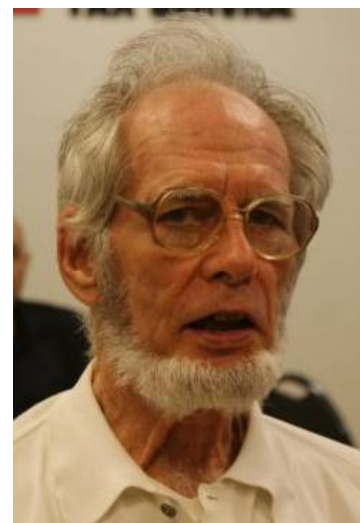
After the folder name, type a period.

After the period type the GUID {ED7BA470-8E54-465E-825C-

99712043E01C} (No spaces are allowed).

Press Enter

Open the folder and you have complete control over Windows 7. You might need several hours to count how many things you can do without having to hunt through layers of screens to access an important, but obscure function.

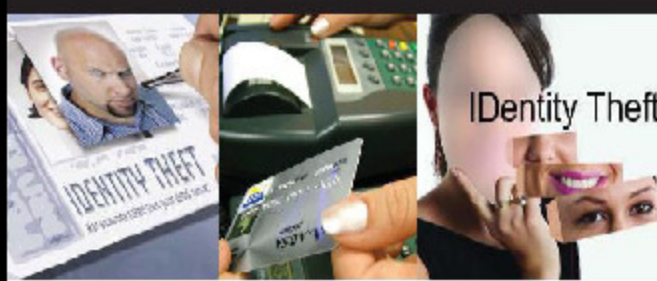

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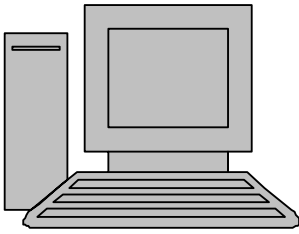
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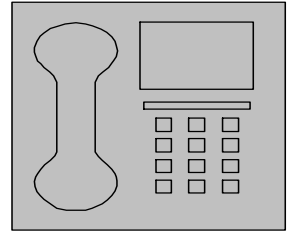

DIRECTIONS TO MONTHLY MEETING
